That the agent enquired through the current at the time the current owners and had received an email saying that there had been a landslide there but that 3 Penny Lane had not been affected, that the landslide had happened as a result of rainfall and pipes bursting, and that in the email that they sent us there was forwarded an email that they had received from the council member, I think it was a building surveyor or someone at the time, who had written an email giving them information about that the rectification works had begun and that the drain work was all fixed and that they were just waiting on materials to do the rest of the work ).

27 28	Q. I see. Madam Chair, can you hear Ms Moran?

	smaller bedroom. And then on the second level, which was

15	the first floor, had two other bedrooms, a bathroom, the
16	laundry, living area and kitchen. And then the third level
17	is - was just like another lounge room.

23	backyard of the house, if you can call it that?

- Q. I see. So you're then on the deck. Your daughter's moving her things. And then what did your daughter do then?
- A. Her hands were full and she was walking through a small hallway to get to the bedroom.

- Q. And then what happened?
- A. She heard noise, and I heard the same noise, and I sort of looked around thinking, "Oh, there's going to be a storm," and went to grab some towels that were hanging, and that was when I heard her call out to me.

- Q. What was the noise that you had heard?
- A. It was like a rumbling, I suppose.

Q. And your daughter called out to you?

A. Yeah. She called out, and at that stage she had moved - she was in front of the laundry, and the laundry door was closed, and when she heard the noise she knew it was coming from out there, so she'd moved back - sorry - to the window, and that was when she could actually see - the window in the living room - she could see the land coming

That was when she called out to me.

- Q. So she called out to you, and you had both heard a noise, and then what happened after that?
- A. I was walking back into the house, and that yeah, we heard the then there was a lot of banging, like bang and rumbling and the house was moving, you could feel it.

Q. And so there's a loud noise. There's rumbling and moving. And you're now in the house with your daughter? A. Yes.

Q. All right. And what happens once you're in the house? A. That was when we noticed - I saw greenery, like a tree, I suppose, outside the living room window, and the laundry had sort of been pushed across the hallway. The laundry door - cupboards in the laundry had come through the wall and we couldn't get access to that end of the house anymore.

Q. Did you feel an impact with the house when this

24	the laundry and the cupboards came through?
25	A. Initially she was there. It was just - sorry, it's
26	just lucky that she walked back.
27	
28	Q. I see. If she'd stayed where she was she would have
29	been in trouble?
30	A. Yes. The laundry door was pushed across the hallway
31	and had actually protruded into that bedroom that was
32	opposite it. So that's where she was standing.
33	
34	Q. That would have been quite shocking for you?
35	A. Yes.

43	through the laundry and even a bit of dirt. So we just
44	left the property, walked down the - luckily the stair - we

To the 15 right of where that photo is is the doors that give you access to the outside, and so, yeah, that's what we could 16 see after the immediate - after the landslide, yeah. 17 18 19 CHAIRPERSON: Is that door, Ms Moran, the laundry door? 20 Yes. Α. 21 22 MR COSTELLO: We'll come back to this here, but it looks 23 as though in that picture there's water on the floor? 24 So I think this picture was taken maybe half an 25 hour after the landslide. 26 27 Q. I see. 28 So there wasn't that much water when we were there, 29 but we could see some water. 30 31 Q. Thank you. And did you take this picture? 32 Α. I think Nick did. 33 34 So you said that you went outside and Q. Okay. Thanks. 35 you called triple 0? 36 Α. Yes. 37 38 Q. And what did they say to you? They actually - they asked what service, and 39 I actually said I don't know. They wanted to know what had 40 happened, and I told them, "I think there's been a 41 landslide at our property." 42 43 44 Q. Did they put you through to another service?

Q. All right. And you spoke then to someone at the SES? A. Yes.

Q. And what did they say?

A. Again, I said, "I think there's been a landslide." They said, "Has a retaining wall come down," and I said, "No, I think it's a bit more than that." We had looked out the window, so we could see the dirt that was impacting to the back of the house. So they said they would have someone come out.

Q. Speaking of retaining walls, did you have a retaining wall in the rear of your property?

A. Yes, we did.

Q. Okay. Could you tell at this point in time whether or not it was still there, or had you not had a sufficient view of the back?

A. No, I couldn't tell.

Q. Thank you. While you were waiting for the SES to arrive what did you and your daughter do?

A. We walked to the front of the property and just
waited, and then we walked back up the stairs - there's
some side stairs around the side of the property that took
you to the backdoor, and we walked up those stairs just so
that we could get a better idea of what had happened.

Q. And did it give you a better idea?

A. Yes, it was very clear that land and vegetation had hit our property.

Q. And as you were making this inspection did you notice any water?

A. Yes. That was when we could - looking in the window we could - we could see that there was water like you can see in that photo.

Q. Inside the house?

A. Yes.

Q. And did you notice any water flowing outside of the house?

A. I didn't.

Q. Okay. Did the water give you some concern?

- A. Yes. It was a substantial amount of water. So we walked back down the stairs. There was a little shed sort of there, and I thought maybe the mains power was there in that area, so I tried to get in there to turn the power off. That was my concern. But it wasn't there. So I called triple O again.

- A. And said, "There's a lot of water coming into our property and it's concerning. Yeah, we probably need some help a little bit more urgently."

  26 Q. By this point at this point, rather, you hadn't yet
  27 spoken with Nick?
  28 A. No.
  - Q. All right. When did you first speak with Nick?A. After shortly after that phone call.
- Q. Okay. And what did you say to him?
  A. I can't remember. I think I said, "You need to come back," basically. I'm not sure, but obviously told him that there had possibly been a landslide. It just felt unbelievable saying those words, but, yeah, just that, "Can you come back?"
- Q. Because he was on his way to Melbourne at this point?
  A. Yes.
- Q. All right. Do you recall how long it was in general terms before the SES arrived?
- A. Initially a man arrived, and I think it may maybe about 20 minutes after, maybe less, 15, 20 minutes, and he said that he was local. So that's why he got there really

1	quickly.
2	
3	Q. And what did you say to him?
4	A. I told him I was - what we had seen and what had
5	happened, and that I was concerned about the power being on
6	with all the water in the house.
7	
8	Q. What did he do?
9	A. He immediately went up the stairs and into the house,
10	I assume, and turned the mains power off, which he told me
11	the power board was located in the pantry in the kitchen of
12	the house.
13	
14	Q. Okay. So at this point there's water in the property
15	but the power's off, there's a single SES person on site
16	with you and your daughter?
17	A. Yes, yes.
18	
19	Q. And then did other SES responders arrive?
20	A. Yeah, shortly after a lot started to arrive.
21	
22	Q. And what did they tell you that they were going to do
23	when they arrived?
24	A. So a man by the name of Mark Daw approached me and
25	said that he was in charge and that he was going to contact
26	Water, South East Water, to have the water turned off,
27	because he had been told of the water that was coming
28	through. By this stage water was running down the stairs
29	of the house into - and then out the front door sort of
30	thing. The stairs lined up with the front door. So there
31	was a lot of water by this stage. And he also said he was
32	going up to the properties up above to see if they could
33	get a better look of what was going on, because you
34	couldn't really see it from our property.
35

- Q. And when you say Mr Glover was giving you rectification works to make the property safe, did he have a written document or was he just relaying to you what he thought needed to be done?

  - A. He had a written document that he handed to us.

Q. Okay. And do you recall if Sue got a copy of that?

A. No, she didn't. We asked for a digital copy. He said, "No, this is your copy."

By this stage there was a lot of media there, so they were sort of behind some bushes near some neighbouring properties. So I went to them.

Thank you. I just - we're really grateful for this inquiry, that this has been established, and we're really grateful for all the board and how they've treated us. We've been treated with such kindness. It's the first time since the 5 Jan landslide that we've felt like we are in caring and capable hands, and we're really hoping that a lot of questions will be answered for our neighbours particularly. They still - especially those who are still not in their homes. And we hope that progress can be made, especially for the Willigenburgs and the McLeans, who have been dealing with this since 2022. So we're very thankful.

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CHAIRPERSON: Thanks for your evidence, Ms Moran. have a couple of questions for you about water. Yes, sure.

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41 42 CHAIRPERSON: When you attended on 14 January after the landslide could you still observe at that time water flowing through or around the house?

So we - we went to the side of the house. 43 couldn't actually see, other than when we walked to the 44 tents and then when we walked home. 45 But you could still 46 see water running down Penny Lane into that drain.

- 1 CHAIRPERSON: And you said earlier that you saw water
  2 flowing consistently from the date of the first landslide,
  3 5 January. Can you describe how fast that water was
  4 flowing? If you think about if you compare it to, say, a
  5 river, was it a fast-flowing was it like a fast-flowing
  6 river through the house, or a slow-flowing river or a
  7 trickle?
  - A. It felt yeah, no, it wasn't a trickle. It was probably a lot more a little bit more than that. I think it was flowing way more than a trickle. I don't know if I would say it was a river, but it was yeah, I think particularly the stairs, when I remember it coming down the stairs, so that felt like it was fast because it was dropping down each time. But even after that, and photos and video that Nick had sent me, you could see it was consistent. It just didn't it didn't ever slow down that I noticed it.

CHAIRPERSON: So if you were to walk up the stairs while the water was flowing down would you get water in your shoes?

CHAIRPERSON: Thank you. Are there any questions? No. That completes your evidence, Ms Moran. Thank you very much for coming along.

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26 27 CHAIRPERSON: Thank you. The statement of Nick Moran is exhibit CA16, and the documents referred to in Mr Moran's statement will be part of CA16. And the same applies in relation to CA15, which is Ms Moran's statement.

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## EXHIBIT #CA16 STATEMENT OF NICK MORAN AND ATTACHED DOCUMENTS.

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MR COSTELLO: Thank you, Madam Chair. Mr Moran, together with your wife, Kellie, who we've just heard from, you own the property at 3 Penny Lane?

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That's right. Α.

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All right. Can you just explain the circumstances by which you came to acquire that property?

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It was - we were looking for something. know, it was a - I had recently sold my business after sort of almost 30 years and we were looking to sort of in a way reward the family and have something pretty special for us.

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45 All right. You hadn't had a holiday home to that Q. 46 point?

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Α. We had an onsite caravan.

- ${\tt Q.}~{\tt I}$  see. And this was the upgrade after the end of 30 years of work, was it?
- A. It was, yeah.
- Q. Okay. Was it always an intention to buy in or around McCrae?
- A. We did look elsewhere, but my wife, Kellie, was dead set on McCrae was the place to be.
- Q. Okay. We've just heard, as you know, quite a bit of evidence from Kellie about the property. But could you perhaps describe the property to us in your own words?

  A. Yes. It's a it was a three- or probably almost a four-storey property. It's funny, you know, we spoke about I hate the beach, I hate the sand, but I like to see it. Kellie loves the sand but isn't fussed about the view. So this was the perfect compromise for us.
- Q. I might just show you a floor plan of the property. It's RES.0009.0001.0006, I hope. Now, it's slightly complicated geography here, which causes houses to be slightly complicated, but the ground floor there, that's at street level as you enter Penny Lane, is it?
- A. It's up quite a number of stairs but, yeah, it's close to street level.
- Q. All right. And the first level looks as though it's not really for family activity so much as sleeping unless you're on the deck?
- A. Yeah, spot on.
- Q. And then the main level of activity is the second floor?
- 35 A. Correct.
- Q. And there's a deck on the ground floor but also a balcony on the second floor?
- A. Yes, the balcony is where we spent the majority of our time if we had people there or even without.
  - Q. And that's where you got your view?
- A. Yes, I got my view, and I didn't sort of move from there much.
- Q. I see. And we can see the laundry there up to the top of the screen on the second floor inset, and that's around

- the area the back of that's around the area where the 2 first landslide impacted, is it? 3 Yeah, the first landslide took out the whole of the 4 laundry and the whole of the bathroom, pretty much the 5 whole side of the house that jutted out. 6 Yes, and we saw a picture earlier of a door coming 7 8 through into that hallway near the stairs? 9 Α. Yeah.
  - Q. And that's the door of the laundry?A. Correct.
  - Q. And what was on the third floor?

    A. The third floor was we turned it into a bit of a bedroom, but it had an, you know, unobstructed view of the ocean, and it was almost like, you know, another living area that the kids quickly occupied when they had mates over.
    - Q. Okay. That floor plan can come down, please. Is it fair to say the third floor was mixed use: if it needed to be a bedroom, it was; if there weren't that many people in the house, it would be used as a living area?
  - A. Or a room for Xbox, yeah.

- A. I'm not sure. Maybe it was definitely dark by that stage. So, you know, when this happened it was light, when the landslide happened. But when I took the video it was dark. So I'm thinking it was an hour or so later.

Q. All right. I might play that video at this point in time, fingers crossed. It's RES.0009.0001.0011. Madam Chair, I've asked for the sound on the video to be muted while it's playing. In the version that will be tendered there are comments being made by Mr Moran as he walks through. But for present purposes I think it's better to see the visual rather than to hear the comments.

CHAIRPERSON: Yes.

MR COSTELLO: If that could be played, please. Mr Moran, while this is playing, if you could just describe where in the house we are?

 A. Yeah, so this is at the top of the stairs on the main living area or living level. You can see where the water's sort of got into. You know, I'm just going around there to get some valuables or some keys and some bits and pieces. So that was primarily what I was doing in this video.

- Q. And there's some other people in the --
- 46 A. So this is the kitchen area --

- Q. Sorry. There's some other people in the house from the SES at the time you're doing this?
  - A. Yeah. There were so many people coming and going that it was really hard to know who was who. Sorry, my camera work's not great.

- Q. This is the second floor?
- A. Yeah, it is. It's the main sort of living area, but you can see the amount of water that is there even though the majority is running down the stairs. And that's the hallway. That's where my daughter was standing, and just by sheer fluke she stepped out of the way.

- Q. Now, it's a little hard to tell. Is there water on these stairs as you're walking down?
- A. Yeah, there is. It was quite a dangerous walk down the stairs. So this is just the entry foyer, I guess, and to the left of the screen is our bedroom and sort of, you know, I guess an adult retreat. And on the right is a kids' bedroom as well.

- Q. Were you surprised by the water that you were seeing as you came in?
- A. Oh, yeah, absolutely. But, again, I just assumed it was a broken pipe. This is our bedroom.

- Q. Is there water there?
- A. Water had got up there on there wasn't any coming down the stairs, but there had been some water. I don't know if it was coming off, you know, the boots and people walking it through.

Q. All right. We can turn that off now, thank you. Before you went in to make - to collect the items that you just mentioned and made that video, had you spoken with Mr Daw from the SES?

28 29 30	Q. When you say "often" what do you mean? Sort of A. Daily.
31 32 33 34	Q every other day or A. No, it's probably two out of every three days.
35 36	Q. Okay. Were there any particular reasons why you were at the property that regularly?
37 38 39	A. I was meeting a variety of people, from our insurance assessors to the council, and just generally feeling like I needed to be there.
40 41 42	Q. Were there often others at the property while you were there?
43 44	A. Yes.
45 46	Q. From SES? A. In the initial days, yes.

Q. And from the council? 1 2 Α. Yes. 3 4 Q. From your insurers? 5 Α. 6 7 And at this point in time did you have to be there to 8 unlock the property to let others in or was the property 9 unsecured? Technically it was unsecured, obviously with the back 10 of the house missing. And I had given the PIN number to 11 those people, but I tended to meet them there if they 12 needed access to inside the house. 13 14 15 All right. Do you recall being provided with an evacuation notice at any point? 16 17 Α. No. 18 19 Let try and go back to the chronology. 20 next day after the landslide was Monday, the 6th. Do vou 21 recall whether you went to the property that day? 22 Α. I did. 23 24 Q. And this is relatively early days so is it safe Okay. 25 to assume that there were SES responders at the property while you were there? 26 27 Α. Correct. 28 29 Did you notice, so far as you can recall, whether 30 anything had changed from the night before? 31 SES had moved some furniture around to, I guess -32 well, for our benefit to ensure they didn't get damaged by 33 water. 34 35 Q. Okay. And we felt they went above and beyond. 36 Α. 37 38 Q. Was there still water coming through the house on the 6th? 39 Yes. 40 Α. 41 42 Q. Were the sandbags in place to divert it? Sandbags were. There was still water there. 43 44 trying to remember whether it was coming down the stairs, 45 but certainly the water was free flowing definitely out and 46 under the house.

And so far as you could tell did it appear to be 1 2 flowing more or less slowly or relatively the same from the 3 day before? It was the same. 4 Α. 5 6 Q. You met with Mr Daw and with Mr Glover --7 Α. Correct. 8 9 Q. -- on the 6th; do you recall that? I think Mr Glover came later because he had been 10 there until the early hours of the morning. 11 12 13 Q. You were told that control was passing from the SES to 14 the council? 15 Correct. Α. 16 17 Who told you that? Q. 18 Α. It would have been Mr Daw. 19 20 Thank you. Now, did either the council or the SES Q. 21 know where the water was coming from at this point? 22 Α. No. 23 24 Q. Did either Mr Daw or Mr Glover have any idea of where 25 the water might have been coming from? 26 I guess the standard response we tended to 27 receive throughout the whole journey was throwing up all 28 options. 29 30 Was it on the 6th that you first heard of I see. the possibility of dye testing? 31 32 Α. Correct. 33 34 Q. And what did you understand the purpose of dye testing to be? 35 Just to trace where the water was starting and then 36 Α. 37 coming out. 38 Okay. And what did you understand to be the options 39 40 in terms of where the water was coming from? Natural spring; drainage; and whether it be, you know, 41 42 actual water, like, water for houses.

Q. And do you recall whether anyone had mentioned the idea of a natural spring to you?

  A. I think everyone's mentioned natural spring. It was definitely Mr Glover and but, you know, Mr Daw was just repeating a lot of what was being said.

  - Q. Okay. Did you speak with Mr Willigenburg on the Monday, the 6th?
    A. I did.
  - Q. Okay. And what do you recall of that conversation?

    A. It was an interesting conversation sort of finding out their history and what they had been through. The information about them seeing or Mr Willigenburg seeing water in the drains out the front when there hadn't been rainfall for such a long time in quite a hot summer was very telling. And once the slip had happened I believe those drains were bone dry.

  - Did you notice water leaking from the nature strips? Q. Α. I did.
  - And at the time did you think that the water could be a result of drainage issues or trench flow or groundwater and/or groundwater?
  - Yes. Well, it could be either of those and I hadn't decided or even thought much about it, to be quite honest, because my head's spinning on this day. But I thought perhaps the trench may have some involvement in it.
  - Could you explain what you mean by trench flow? Q. When they dig a trench in any road infrastructure, it doesn't need to be in a road, it can be in a field, you obviously use an excavator and drag the material out of the hole. They usually lay a bedding in that base of that trench. It can be aggregate, it can be sand, it can be whatever, but different types of product. They then surround it with that same product, and then they usually backfill it and possibly put the road - if it's bitumen, put the road back on.
  - Q. And so what is trench flow? It can be an issue where water can actually transfer outside the pipe in that trench. Because it's coarse rock it's full of holes. And it's a higher speed highway in some places - high-speed highway for water to travel along, especially if it's got grade downhill. Where it might take years to go down there normally or weeks, it would be a
- 47 factor of many times faster going down that trench.

- Q. Are sewer trenches typically graded to have a downfall so force of gravity can operate?
  - A. Sewer always flow downhill, yes.

- Q. Could you explain what groundwater is?
- A. Groundwater is present in most places. It is subsurface water, and can vary in height. It depends on the local conditions. But there's water usually down. It's where if people sunk a pipe they could put a well in, if the conditions provided it. But it lives in harmony with the environment because for thousands of years it's been like that. It only gets troubled if it's disturbed.

- Q. Did you think that the flow of water was odd or unusual on that day?
- A. Oh, yes. Very much so.

- Q. But you didn't look into the water flow that day any further; is that right?
- A. No, at this stage I was more concerned about my wife at home. I knew she was upset even when I left. So I needed to get back home.

Q. I understand. Mr Hutchings, I'm now going to turn to the next day, which is 15 January. On that day there was a meeting at Dromana Hall for residents of McCrae? A. There was.

- Q. Do you recall who attended that meeting?
- A. The majority of residents who I hadn't met, and the council were there, and the SES were there, and Mr Pope was there, and I think somebody from Transport might have been sitting in the audience, and perhaps lawyers as well.

Q. And do you recall that the update stated, amongst other things, that South East Water was investigating customer reports of water leaks in McCrae?

A. Yes.

- Q. Do you recall that the flyer also stated that South East Water had taken water samples to determine the source of the water?
- A. I do.

- Q. And the flyer also said that preliminary data from these tests indicate that the water is not from South East Water's network?
- A. That's right.

- Q. Now, around that time did you see another statement published by South East Water?
- A. I was on the South East Water website trying to get updates because all the council, everybody had a website and trying to keep people updated. So I thought that was great. And I went on there. And I recall, if I'm correct, that it said that there were four water tests carried out in the local area and that they had the results of that, they had low chlorine and fluoride and hence it was not -

- Q. When you say the tests were taken in the local area what did you understand that to mean?
- A. Well, I thought it was up hill where that water was bubbling out. I thought it was around that area, because water mains would have had to have been excluded.

- Q. I see. And when you read the statement that the test results indicated that the levels of chlorine and fluoride were low what did you think about that?
- A. I had a degree of comfort. However, I do know that it could be chlorine can reduce if it travels a long way and, if we haven't actually established where the leak is, then perhaps it would be less than what was expected.

- Q. I see. And were you comforted because it suggested that the water hadn't come from a water main?

  A. I was comforted that South Fast Water had checked
- A. I was comforted that South East Water had checked their infrastructure and that it wasn't a fault.

MS KITTIKHOUN: I see. Madam Chair, I see the time. Would now be a convenient time to take a break because I'm about to move on to a different topic?

## SHORT ADJOURNMENT

MS KITTIKHOUN: Thank you, Mr Hutchings. We've just finished hearing from you about your response to the test results in South East Water's flyer. Could I now turn to a new topic. I can imagine that the McCrae landslide was a huge source of stress for your family?

A. It was and is.

Q. And why was it a huge source of stress for you?

A. Just the - we had put a lot of effort into the house and we were really planning for the sale, as I mentioned earlier. The mother-in-law loves the place she's in. We would like her to stay there. But of course the financial burden is now an issue because we can't sell the house. And we're not sure when we will be able to get it because there's no one giving us any remedies at all of which way forward. So we just don't know where this is going to end up. But she won't be able to afford to stay in that aged

1	care. So it's a concern for the whole family.

- Q. Could you explain what digital meters do?
- A. Digital meters are a wonderful piece of technology as far as I am concerned, but they will actually they replace the typical brass meter that everybody is used to. They're plastic but they've usually got a communication chip inside as well. And it will take 48 readings a day. And it has properties some of them, not all of those meters, I think South East Water call it Sotto, but it's a

- piece of technology that I think is a world first, actually, but that actually can hear acoustic signatures. So every leak has an acoustic signature; it makes a noise. And these meters, if you place that technology, say, in every four houses, 10 houses, whatever the engineers decide, those meters can correlate. So they'll actually say, "I've got a noise and I think it's at 32 metres." And this one might say, "I've got a noise as well and I think it's 64 metres." That tells you that you've got a leak on that pipe or even a service, if possible.
  - Q. I see. So you suggested digital meters be installed in the McCrae area to help potentially isolate the source of the leak?
  - A. Just give a degree of comfort to the individual. I know South East Water has a budget to install them, I think on a million properties if they're planned property. But it's great technology. And they're rolling it out really quick. And they've kept their word. They've done it. They've started rolling out as we talk. They also detect leakage in the property, which is as important because if you get a leak you'll see it on every day you can read these meters.

- Q. Mr Hutchings, do you recall what was discussed at that first meeting of MERG?
- A. It was really remember, many of these people in the room don't know each other and then brought together because of this incident. Some did, but many didn't. And it was about allocating resources. The media were making enquiries. Council needed to be have interface with council meetings set up. Who was going to deal with the finances, correspondence? So people were given responsibilities, sometimes voluntarily, but they were given responsibilities to go and chase things up.
- Q. And was there any discussion about finding out answers about the cause of the landslide?
- A. Yes. That was one of the top topics is, "How do we stop the water coming out?"
- Q. And could you provide any further details about that discussion?
- A. There was and it was allocated or the responsibility was allocated to John and I because of our history, our background.
- Q. Your professional backgrounds in water? A. Yes.
- Q. So John and you were tasked with finding out where the water flowing near the Morans' property was coming from?

  A. At least try. We're two amateurs walking around the streets asking people questions, but at least trying to establish, "Is there something that we've missed?"
- Q. I see. So since the end of January to date you've worked independently and at times with John to investigate the unexpected flows of water in McCrae -- A. Yes.
- Q. -- and their impact on the landslides. I'm now going to ask you a few questions, Mr Hutchings, so you can expand on and explain that work. Can we start on 7 February. On that day you took various photos at different locations in McCrae; is that right?

- Q. And once you heard all of this, Mr Hutchings, did you start to connect the dots between the various pieces of information that you had gathered?
- A. Yes. So our views were starting to firm that this we could be talking about the same incident, all this water happening, and perhaps the burst may have provided the source of water. We didn't really know any length of time, because we knew it was called in on the 24th.

- Q. Yes, that was the report.
- A. That's right. So we're looking to New Year's Eve. So we're saying, "That's a fair time to have water running." And I questioned about how long that main was running up the nobody knew this of course; we didn't know. So I presumed that this would have been a possible source of the water and worth exploring further.

Q. So would it be fair to summarise what you've just said that you thought that the water emanating from the burst side may have travelled across the Mornington Peninsula Freeway and then through this stormwater pit and along that stormwater pipe running parallel to Brett's house and causing all that noise?

- Q. And did you have a sense of how that water might have travelled? Did you think it was trench flow or ground saturation?
- A. Well, the noises that he was hearing was the water rushing into the drains that are upstream. So this is stormwater only, but is an indicator that clearly there's a lot of water up there somewhere. Because you don't get that just by a garden hose. You get it by a severe amount of water. And we hadn't formed how much water would flow at that stage.

- Q. I see. And at that stage did you think that potentially the water had travelled to Charlesworth Street from that location?
- A. Yes.

- Q. That location being Waller Place?
- A. Because if it was coming down the trench of the sewer, which runs I think it runs to the right of that green

line, it does a right - when it gets to outside number 5 it does a right-hand turn. And that kind of coincided with why it is - why is the right-hand side of the nature strip just dripping wet, trucks were sinking in there, but the left's bone dry.

- Q. I see.
- A. It just didn't make sense. And the only asset that runs down there is the sewer. So that's why we started to think, "Is it possible that it's trench flow?"

- Q. I see. Mr Hutchings, I'm going to come back and ask you more questions about the path of water flow but, before I do that, can I ask you some questions about the burst site itself.

- Q. So throughout February you visited the burst site on multiple occasions; is that right?
- A. Correct.

- Q. And have you taken multiple photos and videos at that site?
- A. I have.

- Q. And on 27 February you took three videos of the burst site; is that right?
- A. I did.

- Q. If we could please go to exhibit 12 of Mr Hutchings' statement which is RES.0011.0001.0013. Mr Hutchings, I'll just ask as the video is playing could you please explain your observations at the burst site and in particular could you please indicate to Madam Chair where you think the water main burst? Could the video please be played?

  A. Yes. The water main burst site is in the centre of the photo at the moment, and the sewer is very close. And that was another reason for us taking the video. And this
- that was another reason for us taking the video. And this is where the repair was. And we can see the webbing on the fence. Where we're looking up there now is where the main runs up. This is to the area behind this area is the area that's sodden, was wet. But these are really big brambles and there's a lot of them around there, and I think that they had been cleared for this exercise. So
- this would have been particularly difficult to find, this burst.

A. And this is just poking overlooking inside. And you can see there's fallen trees. That's another indication that the ground is saturated. For a tree to fall over, it's very wet.

- Q. I see. If we could next go to exhibit 13 of Mr Hutchings' statement, which is RES.0011.0001.0014. Mr Hutchings, can you please explain where this video was taken and, as the video is playing, again narrate your observations?
- A. I have just now stepped into the area behind the burst site there, behind the fence. And as you circle around you can see the amount of what I'd call devastation, because all that would have been vegetated, and the water has ripped the plants from the soil or the soil's been washed away; it can be either. But there are indicators on the trees that the soil or the water was higher than what it is now. So you can see it was quite extensive. And I was surprised by this. I wasn't expecting to see such a large area.

- Q. I see. Could we please go to exhibit 14 of Mr Hutchings' statement which is RES.0011.0001.0015. Again, Mr Hutchings, can you explain where this video was taken and your observations?
- A. It's again in the same area of the burst site. You can actually see the markers on the tree where the in my view. This is, again, an amateur speaking here. But there are indicators of where the soil was and where it's no longer there. And you can see where the water's gone down, right down, into the tree roots et cetera. There's a classic example of the depth of material that's been removed through water flow.

Q. Mr Hutchings, how long do you think the ground at the burst site had been wet prior to the January landslides?

A. Well, we know it has to travel to that area on Charlesworth. So that's going to take some time to get there. And we calculated that. And, again, extremely roughly but we calculated it around about two weeks. So, if it was the 24th yet people said it was one or two weeks earlier, we're talking mid-November, by that time. If we say the two weeks for the flow to come through either the trench or the soil or whatever, it would have had to have been at the beginning of November; minimum. But we don't know. And that's why I asked - there was other people

I couldn't - those drains were built in 1972, and one of them is actually a thatched drain, which means they've actually got thatching in them; that's how it works. And they have to be maintained around I don't think that place has ever been about two years. maintained. So the drains that were originally established there are in very poor shape compared to what modern drainage would be. So I see that the drainage is a factor, but the water's quite widespread and I don't know the direction it went.

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- Q. Is it fair to say you saw some damage up to the drain, some damage of vegetation and sediment --
- A. Yes, there's no doubt about it some there's no doubt about it. Flows went down that drain, in my opinion.

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31 32 Q. And just a few moments ago you were asked about possible sources of water other than your theory, and you set out your theory in paragraph 64 and following. If this evidence of an interveningly - by that I mean hiddenly - from private property in Prospect Hill Road from before January 2025 to April 2025, is that something that you think would be a relevant consideration and worth the board inquiring into?

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Q. And, similarly, if there's a leak history for 10-12 View Point Road - and by that I mean leak allowances in 2015, 2018, 2023 - that, too, would be something worth the board looking into in terms of possible water sources?

A. Oh, well, that's up to the board, I think. Possibly so. I should stress this is a theory. We're not saying this is the whole reason. This is just something to be looked at.
